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


In Memoriam



### Timeless Tombstones

### ~ The Historic Congressional Cemetery ~



As genealogists and researchers most of us are aware of a number of historic cemeteries and graveyards such as Gettysburg or Arlington National but this cemetery seems to have gotten lost or forgotten amongst the others. The Historic Congressional Cemetery in Washington D.C. touts some of the most historic figures in our nations history. Buried here are notables of J. Edgar Hoover, John Phillip Sousa, Mathew Brady, journalist Cokie Roberts, and and the cemetery sections also represent Native Americans, African Americans, LGBT, educators, politicians, civil rights figures and K-9 companions. Located on the opposite side of the Potomac as Arlington National Cemetery, north of the Navy Yard, the cemetery holds 65, 000 burials and is filled with unique and creative headstones and monuments. Cenotaphs of many American congressmen and government leaders are memorialized in the rows of identical cenotaph monuments. ( photo above) Also honored in memorials are the 21 women killed when the Washington Arsenal blew up in 1864 and there is a public vault for holding remains for various reasons until funerals take place. First Lady Dollie Madison was held in the vault for two years until funds could be raised for her burial at Montpelier.

Through the years the cemetery has had many ups and downs as far as upkeep and funding. Several years the cemetery was closed because of unkept and unsightly grounds. In 1999 funding was secured and and grounds keeping and upgrading started and today it welcomes visitors, conducts tours and is active cemetery.

The cemetery is administered by the Association for the Preservation of Historic Congressional Cemetery (APHCC), which is a non-profit corporation headed by a 15-member board of directors. The association has five full-time employees, one part-time archivist, and over 500 volunteers. The APHCC named Paul K. Williams President in July 2012. Historic Congressional Cemetery preserves, promotes, and protects our historic and active burial ground. We respectfully celebrate the legacy of those interred here through education, historic preservation, community engagement, and environmental stewardship. Congressional Cemetery is also known for allowing members of the Association for the Preservation of Historic Congressional Cemetery (APHCC) to walk dogs off-leash on the cemetery grounds. In addition to their membership dues, K-9 Corps members pay a fee for the privilege of walking their dogs. K-9 Corps members provide about 20% of Congressional Cemetery's operating income. 

### LOOKING BACK

#### From the Tales and Trails Archives

source unknown WHO WAS THAT FAMILY TREE I SAW YOU WITH? There is no such thing as a lukewarm genealogist. It's true that a run-of-the-mill family tree tracer methodically jots down what someone gives or sends to him, doesn't get very excited about the mail and can put genealogy aside in favor of going to lunch with a friend. But a true family tree nut will hide the telephone bill from the spouse, buy stamps by the sheet, not operate well until mail time, then hate the mail man if nothing genealogical is delivered, beat the typewriter until 2 a.m. and get up the next day A real genealogist will plod through cemeteries looking at tombstones in pouring rain and winter's winds with fingers and toes numbing, flout poison ivy and, after finding that the film was not winding through the camera, as happened to me, travel many miles to return to the same cemetery under the same conditions. A genealogy bug collects papers full of possible information until that end of the house where they are stored sags, then hesitatingly suggests a room be added, all the while being the steadiest customer of the public library, where he is recognized as the one who resembles a pack horse. A genealogist dislikes others who want to drone on and on about their family tree and findings, loves anyone who is researching one of his names, even if it is Smith or Jones, is always going to get things filed tomorrow but never does, thinks his knee-high piling system (as opposed to filing system) is justified no matter who has to wade through it or fall over it, likes to drone on and on about his family tree and findings, and can't bear to part with even the tiniest scrap of paper.

After all, that might contain the missing link. A genealogist can best be described as a loner, a meditator, a lover of clutter, a collector of dimes for copy machines and a constant student of history, especially migration routes of his forebears. He tolerates non-genealogists and the people who refer to genealogy as a "hobby" - after all, he is discovering his personal history and recording it all in one spot. If certain diseases follow from one generation to the next, he can possibly assist a doctor with a diagnosis. (or she) abhors those who say they started but found a skeleton in the closet. He knows they never tried. Granted, there may be skeletons, but we can't be responsible for them. He knows, too, that the very person who thinks genealogy is silly will some day eat humble pie and ask, knowing that the answer will be there. A genealogist thinks exercise is nutty and time-consuming. He believes there is enough exercise in stooping, bending over file drawers and lifting boxes to the table. A genuine genealogist spends money for gas instead of clothes. He buys expensive books, paper by the ream, envelopes by the hundreds, loose-leaf notebooks, subscriptions to county publications, and some buy home copy machines and microfilm readers. If he feels he is spending too much, he cuts corners until the conscience is cleared. Most genealogists are amiable. After all, who can argue with a forebearer? We put faces on people of long ago, imagine ourselves in their shoes and try to reason why : they moved again, at the same time knowing that most married a neighbor because there was no one else to meet. Much can be learned from "digging" into one's past: perseverance, patience, logic and respect for those who were here before. We feel we will have to live to be a hundred to accomplish all that is necessary. Counting yourself at No. 1, in 10 generations, you will find 1,023 direct ancestors. This is part of the fascination of genealogy - it is never finished.

### Anne Markgraf Ward



I, Anne Emielie Otillie Markgraf better known as "Annie", was born on the Fourth of July, 1922 at ranch Panakanic in Klickitat County, Washington. My parents were Charles F. and LuDell Bertschi Markgraf, both of whose parents were pioneers of the Camas Prairie area. My older siblings attended the one-room, eight-grade, board-and-batten school in the Panakanic Valley. My sister Emily and I were the first of our family to begin our educations at White Salmon; she in 1926 and myself in 1928.

Although from the age of four years I no longer had two feet on the ground, I was an energetic and alert tomboy and kept up with my classmates and life in general.

After graduation from CUHS in the spring 1940, I worked for Gladden Motor Company, the telephone office and the U.S. Post Office, all in White Salmon.

When my friend George, (who had taught here from the fall in 1940 to 1942) returned from service in Africa and Italy with the U.S. Army we were married in December 1946 in Pullman, Washington. We spent our wedding night in the men's dorm at Pullman as it was Christmas break. From that time on I, naturally, led a dual life. "We" received our Masters Degree in Botany from Washington State University in 1948, and "our" Doctorate in Biology at Stanford University in 1952. At Stanford, California, we also received our Mom and Pop Degrees with the arrival of two daughters.

Between and among carrying for a husband, rearing children, managing the household, moving thirteen times, mounting herbarium specimens, typing theses, being a Girl Scout Troop leader, chaperoning students, being an active member of Knox Facility Wives, swimming in the Knox pool, working with groups interested in ecology, traveling a bit, running for a Knox County political office, re-learning to use prostheses, presidenting the local League of Women Voters, and researching genealogy and allied history in libraries, courthouses and cemeteries. I attended classes at Washington State University and at Knox College –not graduating, but enjoying the broadened perspectives that are the reward of continuing education. We lived in Galesburg, Illinois from 1954 until 1982 when George retired as Professor of Biology after teaching for 28 years at Knox College.

Knox is a liberal arts college which was established in 1837 on a rise in the wet-land, high-grass prairie of the mid-west. I was amazed and delighted to discover that my great- great- uncle and –aunts had matriculated at Knox during the 1840's and 1850s, and were probably present at the Lincoln-Douglas debates held at Knox.

Upon returning to the "hills of home" in Washington State we assisting each other in constructing a post and beam, one-floor house, set in the midst of western evergreens.

George and I were part of the organizers that formed the West Klickitat County Historical Society and opened our first museum, the Gorge Heritage Museum. We both served on the Board for the next 15 years, collecting and preserving local history of this wonderful area.

With the passing of my dear George in 2003 I began putting pen to paper and writing the stories of the rich history of Klickitat County. I continued to live in our home near Trout Lake and enjoy the country life.

As I reached into my early 90's I knew it was time to move closer to medical facilities and my long time doctor in White Salmon. I had a smaller home built for me as I now spent much of my days in a wheelchair. I also wanted to be closer to the museum so I could continue my research in their files. I even was reelected to the Board of the West Klickitat County Historical Society for a couple of years as I remained independent.

I am survived by my dear daughter Dr. Barbara Ward and her husband Alex and my precious grandchildren Rebecca and Ben of Wellington, New Zealand.

I passed in my own home in White Salmon, spending 98 years 9 months and 13 days on this earth. AW


