MOTOR CAR LICENCE DUTIES FOR YEAR 1919.


NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons resident within the administrative County of Waterford (keeping Motor Cars, Motor Bicycles or Tricycles, and required, before the expiration of the licence, to take out a Licence and deliver duly filled in to the POSTMASTER, DUNGARVAN, the Statutory Declaration required by the above Act, and pay at the POST OFFICE, DUNGARVAN, the duty, with which they shall appear by such declaration to be chargeable.

The penalty for neglecting or refusing to deliver, or for making an untrue declaration, is TWENTY POUNDS over and above any duty payable.

A similar penalty is also incurred by every person who keeps a Motor Car, Motor Bicycle or Tricycle without having taken out a proper Licence.

FEMALE TRAINED NURSE WANTED.

NORWEGIAN SAILOR CHARGED WITH LARCENY.

At a special court at Waterford Court-house on Monday, before Mr. D. H. Lynd, J.P., a Norwegian sailor named Olaf August Markussen, a member of the crew of the 'Asp', at present discharged grain at Messrs. Hall's berth, was charged with the larceny of a gold watch, valued at £10, the property of Henry Casell, steward on the vessel. Only formal evidence of arrest was given. Sergeant Rowan stated the accused made no statement when arrested. On his application the accused was remanded for eight days in custody.

SEVENTY YEARS AGO.

Seventy years ago Thomas Francis Meagher was a candidate for the representation of Waterford City. He was opposed by two Whigs, Sir Henry Winston Barron and Mr. Patrick Costello. The local Tories adopted similar tactics to those they adopted in 1848. They cast their votes for the Whig Barron, who was elected by a narrow majority. The population of the city in 1848 was about the same as its population to-day, but only about 800 citizens were entitled to the franchise. The combined Whig and Tory poll in 1848 was 564, and 160 voted for Meagher, leaving the patriot in a minority of 414.

SHORT-LIVED STRIKE AT WATERFORD.

On Wednesday the casual labourers employed in the grain stores of Waterford went on strike for an increase of pay. Their demand was for 10s. a day, their present remuneration being 7s. a day. The employers made an offer of 7d., which the men declined. After a few hours the men returned to work, on the communication of the heads of their union pending negotiations between the employers and the men's representatives. These negotiations took place yesterday.

COAL WORKERS' INCREASE.

Waterford coal heavers have now got an increase of 2d. per ton, making their rate 1s. 2d. per ton, and 1d. an hour over time. Under a recent award the coal workers, including carters, etc., employed by Messrs. McMullagh, got 6s. a week increase, which is retrospective as from November last.
