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

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# PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

FARMERS' RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES DURING SHOOTING SEASON

The shooting season for pheasants got off to a flying start under ideal weather conditions on Tuesday last, November 1 and from first light on Tuesday morning fowlers were on the move in force. The shooting season will extend over the next three months and in addition to pheasants will include other game birds such as duck, woodcock and snipe.

To coincide with the opening of the season the IFA have issued a warning to members reminding them of the rights and liabilities of farmers in regard to the shooting season and advising them to insist that any persons whom they allow on to their lands during the period will operate fully within the terms agreed between the IFA and the National Association of Regional Games Council (NARGC), to which most gun clubs in the country are affiliated.





# Concern About Kilgobinet Water Supply

Deputy Austin Deasy has received the following letter, Board has shown the supply to dated October 17 from Mr. be continuously satisfactory. John O'Flynn, County Engineer following representations made by him expressing the concern of local people about the do-mestic water supply in Kilgobinet:

There are four supply sources in the Kilgobinet area:

(1)—Spring at Ballyconnery;
(2)—Borehole with gravity

feed at Ballyconnery: (3)—Stream intake at In-

(4)—Borehole at Ball Alley. The ball alley borehole is not in use. The Ballyconnery spring in use. The Ballyconnery spring is insufficient to supply the area in Summer, though they are adequate for the remainder of the year. The Ballyconnery borehole and gravity feed has had problems from air locking, which has resulted in occasional supply interruptions. The problems with the foregoing sources have resulted in the sources have resulted in the Inchindrisha stream source being used during the Summer.

This source has led to a number of consumer complaints, though monitoring by

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lated sample during last July, possibly following heavy rain.
The Inchindrisla source was replaced by the Ballyconnery springs at the beginning of eptember. To improve the position per-manently, it is proposed to in-

stal a pump in the Ballycon nery borehole and construct a new pumphouse, which would overcome the present air lock-ing difficulties and allow that source to be used in Summer, replacing the Inchindrisla stream. The reduction in Coun-cil funding in 1988, resulting rom the cutbacks in our Rate upport Grant prevented us completing this work earlier this year. We are presently planning to undertake this work prior to Summer 1989, if our finances permit. This should improve the quantity and quality of supply to the

area.

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





The ideal age for immuniza-

Children who have al-ready had any of the diseases —measles, mumps or rubella—should still receive the MMR vaccine as should children who have already been immunized against measles.
