April 15: Glenn Crytzer & His Syncopators

The Syncopators are a jazz band dedicated to the popular music of the 1920s, 1930s and early 1940s. Founded in 2007 by Glenn Crytzer, the group has become the premiere swingera band in the US, having won over the hearts and feet of dancers across the nation. Their musical influences include jazz greats such as Benny Goodman,





Following a Friday night pre-festival jam at the Rosemont Round Table Pizza, the **Trad. Jazz Youth Band Festival** took place during the February Jazz Sunday weekend. There were Saturday performances, clinics and mentored jam sessions in several venues on three floors of Capistrano Hall on the Sac State campus. **Dr. Steve Roach**, CSUS Director of Jazz Studies, agreed that this was our best festival ever. How fortunate we are to have such a highly regarded festival director in Steve, and a faculty of respected jazz educators and musicians who made a commitment to the festival. The adjudicators awarded \$4,000 in festival scholarships this year!

Over 100 day-of-event volunteers, under the coordination of 27 festival committee chairpersons (to be listed on the TJYBF website), worked seamlessly together to present a fun scholastic event for about 300 band students in 30 bands from California and Utah.

A Kid's Eye View of the TJYBF

66 Johnny Jazzkid," a first-time festival participant, was a bit overwhelmed by the time he reached the lobby of Capistrano Hall. For weeks, his director had been preparing the group for this day, but Johnny's first challenge was navigating the maze that is the CSUS campus!

Once inside, Johnny was immediately struck by the sheer number of musicians, in all styles of dress, here for the same music he had grown to love. Johnny ran upstairs to warm up, then almost immediately back downstairs for their performance. He was a bundle of nerves. All too quickly, the doors opened and it was time to step on stage in the Music Recital Hall. Johnny's heart went into overdrive; it was SO big, SO beautiful and SO utterly terrifying!

Johnny's band overcame their initial shock and played their hearts out for three songs. Immediately after, they were joined onstage by Feedback Clinician **Gordon Au**. Obviously talented, Gordon peppered the band with ideas to help tighten and further refine the songs. Johnny, though nervous about trying to execute what Gordon was saying, was excited at the sudden improvements it brought to the band.

The band was ushered back upstairs, this time for a lead sheet clinic with **David Robinson**. David asked them to play a tune. The band picked their favorite and got a chance to immediately apply Gordon's suggestions. In that small room, with the pressure off, they played better than ever before, thrilling themselves and their entourage. David was very positive and gave them still more ideas for their performance. The band was at a fever pitch of excitement; they had no idea that they could sound so good!

The final stop was pictures; then the band could finally congratulate each other and reflect on their whirlwind experience. Johnny and his friends would spend the day watching other groups, attending clinics, hearing tunes for the first time and even jamming with new friends. That night, even though his band didn't give a command performance, he saw the quality of the bands that did. In the days that would follow, after hearing the adjudicator's comments and talking as a group with their director about the experience, Johnny's band now had a fire in them to work all the harder for next year.





Elinor Hackett told me her friend and former neighbor, Jackie Croy, was out for the first time (Cont. on page 10)













Their debut album, *Harlem Mad*, consisting of 20 original songs was released in May 2011.

About Glenn Crytzer

Musical Director Glenn Crytzer's background includes both classical music and jazz. He earned his Bachelor of Music in classical composition from the Florida State University in 2003 and a Master of Music in classical composition from the Cleveland Institute of Music in 2006. Crytzer's classical works have been programmed by the American Modern Ensemble, the Hachidori Duo, the Northwest Symphony Orchestra and more. In 2005, he was awarded a BMI Student Composer Award for his Orchestral piece, "Nocturne Fantasy."

While studying at Florida State, he took up swing dance as a hobby and has been dancing for over 11 years. Through dance, Glenn became interested in classic jazz and took up the banjo in 2005. Encouraged by a warm welcome in the Cleveland early jazz scene, Crytzer soon founded the Any Measure Jazz Band with fellow students at the Cleveland Institute of Music. After moving to Seattle in 2006, Crytzer began seeking out musicians to form the Syncopators, a band that would uphold the stylistic integrity of the music of the jazz and swing eras.

Crytzer switched to guitar in 2008 and founded the Blue Rhythm Band, the big band counterpart to the Syncopators. Since that time, he has continued to refine the bands' style while writing new songs and arrangements in the vintage style. *Harlem Mad,* the Syncopators' debut album, features 20 original songs composed by Crytzer during 2009 and 2010.

TJYBF 2012

One small thing stands out in my mind from the 7th annual Trad Jazz Youth Band Festival: one of the young musicians referenced the late (very lamented), droll and dry Bob Finch of Chicago 6. When a teenager is so deep into Trad Jazz that he can quote a bass player four years gone, you have to figure he'll be playing OKOM for life. And there were about 200 like-minded young musicians in evidence on February 11. They didn't seem to get it that they are playing anachronistic music that "only old people like." In fact, it seemed to us older observers that these musicians know more about "The Music," as well as about music in general, than we know after lifetimes devoted to it.

Many, many thanks to all the band directors, all the volunteers (especially **Yvonne Au**), all the clinicians and adjudicators and sponsors and donors and vendors and audience members. I know you had fun. The point is—so did the student musicians.

We're up to 30 bands for the event. Thank goodness for Sac State's Director of Jazz Studies, **Dr. Steve Roach**, and his enthusiastic commitment of time, expertise and space in cosponsoring the event. I heard a bit of gossip about Steve earlier in the year—after a couple of years' exposure to Trad, he now insists that all his Jazz students learn something about the foundations of Jazz. Way to go, Steve!

Flocks of young people started swooping into Capistrano Hall around 7:15—the first bands warmed up at 7:30 a.m.—and the lobby was full right up until everybody crowded into the Music Recital Hall for the Awards, encore performances and Closing Concert (featuring clinicians) to wrap up the day.

One of that first flight at 7:30 was an Elementary School band from **Mission Avenue Open**, calling themselves the **Stinky Cheese Hobos**, directed by **Mica Dugan**. An *elementary* school band! Did you get that? Way to go, Mica.

John Soulis from East Bay Trad Jazz Society brought Jazzinators I and II from the Fremont and Milpitas area. We already knew they were good, so we booked the blended groups for the first set at STJS the next day. For Jazz Sunday, we also booked the Red Hot Moldy Fig Stompin' Babies Jass Club of Rio Americano for Set 3 on the Main Stage. Do not be deceived by the jokey name; Josh Murray and Max Kiesner have made sure they are polished to perfection. And the same can be said about Rio's Bayou Tide.

Another band from Fremont is the excellent college-age Green Tie Jazz Band, directed by John-David Kagawa. In fact, we had 6 college bands: Jazz Combo I and II from Sac State, Sea-Monkey All-Stars from Davis, RJ² from American

River, and Jazz Legacy from Brigham Young (led by the star of "Jazz for Cows" on YouTube, Steve Call). Sea-Monkeys are the on-going production of Felicia Greenwood Weatherly; RJ² is directed by Susan Hamre; Jazz Combo I is directed by Tim Stephenson, and Jazz Combo II by Gerry Pineda.

Ms. Weatherly is also responsible for River City HS groups: Syncopating Sea-Monkeys I and II, well known to STJS Jazz Sunday audiences. One more Fremont band is Dixie Dominus from Fremont Christian, led by Thomas Banuelos. Man! Are they good? Yes, they are! And Mr. Banuelos also brought a middle school band from Fremont Christian, Shave and a Haircut. The bright yellow shirts and hat bands made them easy and fun to track.

Headed South, the **Reedley River Rats** are from—Reedley! **Samuel Gipson** directs this high school group, now in its 29th year! Various incarnations have appeared at Jubilee over the years. Headed back this direction, **Nancy Kreis** brought two groups from Elk Grove—**Loose Change** (from **Elk Grove HS**) and **Take Two**, a privately sponsored high school age group. **Polly Edgerton** sponsored another private group, **Dynamite Jazz Band**, directed by Polly's son, Thomas. (You know by now that it's *Dee-na-meaty*, right?) Polly is the director of **Creekview Ranch MS**'s **Jazzers** AND **Jazz Raptors**. **Bob Williams** is the director of this year's **TNT**, which STJS is proud to sponsor.

I understand from the printed program that **Brian Gayek** went to **STJS Trad Jazz Camp** last summer and immediately put together **4243 Jazz**, members of the Advanced Band class from **John Barrett Middle School** in Carmichael, who volunteered for extra rehearsals and practice time to learn about OKOM. Good man, Brian! And **Rick Baker** brought the cool Gelato from Arden Middle School.

I've lost count of how many bands that is, but there were SIX bands sponsored privately by **J Street Studios** in Davis, and directed by **Celia Cottle** (who apparently *IS* J Street Studios): high schoolers **9 Lives Jazz Intersection**, **Sax by Popular Demand**, **J Street Jazz Cats** and **Crazy Eights**, and middle schoolers **Jazzamatazz** and **Jazz Happy**. And THAT's why **Ms. Cottle** was awarded our inaugural **STJSF Jazz Education Award**. Well done, Celia!

All the awards presented are listed elsewhere, and you can read through them in a minute or two. But do not for one minute think that they are negligible things. They matter to these young musicians. Every student was on the edge of their chair, and every award was greeted by whoops and cheers for their winning band mates. And they poured on stage to join the Clinicians for the last number of the day—everybody took a solo and everybody was cheered mightily.

It made my heart sing! I can't wait till next year. ❖

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
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
