IRASBURG — The Leach Public Library in Irasburg held the ninth edition of its Gingerbread Open House on Saturday.

The promise of gingerbread featured on a sign outdoors lured people into the library, where the smells of Christmas — evergreens, sugar, and spice — greeted them.

From 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. people could taste all kinds of cookies and

But this year, she didn't see the usual crowd from the fair.

In fact, her daughter said she was up until 1:30 a.m. finishing the baked goods.

Others helped make sweets as well. Rita Sylvester made sugar cookies, and Colette Houle made peanut butter cookies.

cider, participate in a raffle, decorate cookies, and listen to beautiful music.

The purpose of the event was to raise money for the library, but it's not a moneymaker, so the hope is that it will generate more traffic to the library, librarian and organizer Laurie Green said.

"We've never had it this early," she said when asked about the turnout.

Normally the open house occurs in the first or second week of December, and people who go to the craft fair in the town hall next door come by to check out the activities. cut the day before and decorated with cookies and candy canes.

Ms. Green's daughter Althea Holland and Brittany Berry manned the raffle table.

For \$5 people could get six raffle tickets. They wrote their names on them and put them in bags of their choice to bid on items like books, chocolate, maple syrup, a gingerbread house, a poinsettia, Legos, an Advent calendar, a jewelry box, caramel corn, and local honey.

Ms. Holland was one of the performers that afternoon. She played the flute.

"It's a good way to donate and then possibly win goods," she said.

Meanwhile, Oscar and Olivia Peters were hard at work at the cookie decorating station. They had plain tree- and heart-shaped cookies to choose from, butter knives, a Tupperware container full of frosting, and bowls and shakers filled with M&Ms, chocolate chips, sprinkles, and cinnamon candies for decorating.

"I'm trying to make the frosting smooth," three-year-old Olivia said as she conscientiously spread a thin layer of frosting around on her cookies.

A lot of it ended up on her fingers, which she didn't mind.

"I like licking my fingers after I bake something," she explained after pulling her frosting-covered finger out of her mouth with a pop.

Her decoration of choice was

chocolate chips, which she piled high on each of the heart-shaped cookies she picked.

Her brother Oscar, five, worked on tree-shaped cookies, which he proclaimed to be his favorite.

He had a different strategy from his sister. After glopping on a thick layer of frosting, he positioned the red cinnamon candies in straight lines on his tree, and then shook a generous amount of green sprinkles on top.

The trick is to put the cookie upside down over a previous cookie or a plate to eliminate excess sprinkles, he said.

Usually each child is allowed two cookies, but as the day drew to an end, there were still many cookies left, and Oscar and Olivia were asked if they wanted to make more cookies for their parents.

"Oh sure!" Olivia said enthusiastically.







UVM Extension developed the course to empower limited-resource families with young children to eat healthy on a budget and become more physically active. The small group course is engaging, interactive, and fun.

Military honors will be presented to Mr. Lucas by the Vermont National Guard.



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

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
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### Public meeting to get feedback on draft water quality rules

The Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food, and Markets (VAAFM) has scheduled a public meeting in Newport at the East Side Restaurant from 2 to 4 p.m. on December 8 to receive comments and input on its draft copy of the Required Agricultural Practices (RAPs). The period of public comment which will run through December 18, 2015.

It's a pre-filing period which will afford the opportunity for all interested stakeholders to review the draft RAPs and provide initial comment before VAAFM formalizes the draft this winter and enters into the formal rulemaking process in the spring of 2016. Additional public comment periods will follow both the draft rewrite as well as the formal rulemaking period.

A copy of the draft RAP document can be found at agriculture.vermont.gov/sites/ag/files/pdf/water\_quality/VAAFM-Draft-RAP.pdf.

The public meeting will include a detailed presentation of the draft RAPs, with a question and answer session to follow. In order to maximize public input, VAAFM is also offering to hold smaller group meetings for interested organizations and stakeholders to review the rules in greater detail. "It is important for all stakeholders to understand the rules are in draft form — and that their feedback in this process is critical," said Vermont's Agriculture Secretary, Chuck Ross.

"We are holding these meetings because we want to engage with the public, to gather their feedback, and to ensure we are implementing a realistic, workable framework for agricultural practices in our state that effectively protects our lakes and rivers. We hope, and expect, that key stakeholders will step up and attend these meetings, to ensure their perspectives are heard."

VAAFM was directed by the Legislature to draft the RAPs pursuant to Act 64, signed into law on June 16, 2015. Act 64 amended and enacted multiple requirements related to water quality in the state. The Accepted Agricultural Practices (AAPs) were rewritten to a higher level of performance and renamed the Required Agricultural Practices (RAPs). VAAFM was charged with revising the RAPs by rule on or before July 1, 2016. Act 64 requires that the revised RAPs include requirements for: small farm certification, nutrient storage, soil health, buffer zones, livestock exclusion, and nutrient management.

"The Agency of Agriculture wants to be very transparent with this process," said Jim Leland, VAAFM's Director of Agricultural Resources Management Division. "This collaborative process will ensure VAAFM develops a rule which meets the intent of Act 64, and is workable and implementable by the diversity of agricultural operations in the state."

In addition to requiring the implementation of RAPs, Act 64 instructed VAAFM to establish a program certifying and training small farm operations. With over 7,000 farms in the state, according to the 2012 USDA Ag Census, a significant portion of small farms could be required to newly certify compliance with the RAPs when the program is implemented on July 1, 2017.

"Farms of all sizes will be impacted by the RAPs, which is why it is important for all farmers to attend a meeting and provide comment," said Leland.

Significant and expanding technical and financial assistance is available from federal, state and local organizations, including Vermont's new Clean Water Fund established by Act 64. This will help ensure farms of all sizes are able to continue to access resources to assist in the planning and implementation of management changes and conservation practices to improve water quality on farms.

"Farms of all sizes are already making significant progress at developing plans and implementing conservation practices statewide," said Leland. "When implemented, the RAPs will set a roadmap and standards to ensure current and future planning efforts are as effective as possible at improving water quality on farms in Vermont."

Act 64 also requires that a VAAFM submit a draft report on water quality considerations regarding tile drainage to the legislature in January 2016, with the RAPs revised to include requirements for tile draining by January 15, 2018. Successful implementation of the RAPs will assist in Vermont's mission to meet the goals of Act 64 as well as the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for phosphorus for Lake Champlain.

Comment received by VAAFM regarding the draft RAPs will be used solely for consideration during the revision of the RAPs and will not be used for water quality regulatory enforcement purposes. VAAFM encourages farm operations to submit comment with examples of areas on their farm where their current management meets state water quality standards, but would be out of compliance with the draft rules. — from VAAFM.





# What not to do when visiting your ex

All of my Louisiana stories are a little odd, the nature of the place being a contributing factor. But this is among the oddest. The story involves an ex-husband, a car wreck, and a misunderstanding that worked in my favor.

I've been thinking about Louisiana lately. Probably because winter is coming on, though it's been blessedly slow about it this year.

Also, because Howard Mosher suggested I read James Lee Burke, who writes murder mysteries that take place in and around New Orleans, my favorite city.

Both have led me to a yearning for New Orleans food, Cajun food, Creole food — strong coffee with hot milk, gumbo, dirty rice, beignets, crusty bread — and New Orleans itself.

Michael and I had long been divorced, and it had not been an amicable 20 years. But both of us were about to get divorced again, from second marriages, and somehow that led to peace and an invite from Michael to visit him in Louisiana. He was in the Army.

I flew to New Orleans, and he picked me up and we drove four hours north to Fort Polk, where he was stationed, doing things that were entirely interesting but which, he informed me, I did not officially know anything about.

So I remain mum, though I will say that my estimation of the U.S. military went up sharply.

I have no idea what the soldiers thought about having their master sergeant tour a journalist, who also happened to be an ex-wife, through the base's most intimate operations.

They were a cheerful lot, though — intense, but extremely polite, as military people tend to be. Over the next few days, Michael showed me around the base, we watched the Olympics, and I cooked. Judging from Fort Polk, I don't know why everyone in the U.S. military doesn't weigh 500 pounds. There were lots of bars and restaurants around the base, which is actually a beautiful place with historic buildings and a preserved forest, but the

restaurants served food in ways that contained as many calories as could be stuffed into a meal.

My cell phone had conked out on the way to Louisiana, so I was out of contact with people at home. It turned out that, in order to get a replacement, I had to drive to Alexandria, so Michael said I could borrow his car while he was at work and drive to the AT&T store that would provide me with a new, functioning phone.

His car was a small, nondescript sedan, the drive was an hour or so. I managed, after some argument, to get a new phone and headed back to the base.

But between Alexandria and Fort Polk, I ran into a traffic circle. I've never been good with traffic circles, which I believe are designed to create accidents, and this day I had one. Two black men in a souped up red car, drove into the side of Michael's little sedan.

When police arrived, the driver of the other car was shouting at me, and I was thinking, yikes, I'm a northerner in Louisiana. The cops asked for my license, registration, etc., and I handed over my license and Michael's registration.

It quickly became apparent that there wasn't much question about how this was going down. Two loud fellows in a hot car and hot clothing, versus Mrs. U.S. Army white woman from Fort Polk in a beige sedan that had been rammed.

But on the other hand, it's a hard thing to hide.

He later told me the car was totaled. Let's just say he wasn't happy.

The next day I was due to fly home, probably a good thing. The plan was for me to rent a car and drive myself to New Orleans to the airport. Except that when I showed up at the rental car place, I didn't have a license, thus couldn't rent a car.

Apparently, in the mishmash of the accident, the police had forgotten to hand back my license, and I hadn't noticed.

Michael sighed. This meant he had to either keep me forever, or drive me back to New Orleans himself. Not much of a choice there.

"You're as much of a pain in the ass as you always were," he said.

We picked up his girlfriend, who'd apparently been getting, understandably, a little crosswise, or at least puzzled, by this week with the ex. The three of us drove the four hours to New Orleans, me in the back seat.

Michael wasn't in the best mood, but his girlfriend and I got along fine. She hadn't likely ever planned on spending much time with her boyfriend's long ago ex-wife from Vermont, but perplexed as she probably was, she rose to the occasion.

This is a long way of getting around to food, which is obviously a sidebar in this story. But it's true that I've been thinking about the region's food.

Recently, I invited friends over to watch one of the presidential debates, and I made red beans and rice.

Talk about digressions, huh?

Here is the recipe I made.

1 pound dried red beans

3 Tbsp. bacon grease

1/4 cup chopped ham

1-1/2 cups chopped onion

3/4 cup chopped celery

3/4 cup chopped green pepper

1/2 Tsp. salt

1/2 Tsp. pepper

Pinch cayenne

Three bay leaves

2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

2 Tsp. thyme

1/2 pound smoked sausage, split in half lengthwise and cut into one-inch pieces

A ham bone or a pound of smoked ham hocks

3 Tbsp. chopped garlic

10 cups chicken stock

4 cups cooked white rice

1/4 cup chopped green onions

Put the beans in a bowl and cover with water. Let soak for eight hours. Drain and set aside. In a big pot, heat the bacon grease over medium heat. Add the ham and cook, stirring, for one minute. Add the onions, celery and peppers. Season with the salt, pepper and cayenne and cook, stirring until the vegetables are soft. Add the bay leaves, parsley, thyme, sausage and ham hocks and cook, stirring, to brown the sausage. Add the garlic, beans, and stock. Stir well and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to medium low and simmer, uncovered, stirring occasionally, until the beans are tender, about two hours. Remove from heat and with the back of a spoon, mash about 1/4 of the beans against the side of the pot. Then cook for another 15 minutes or so. Serve over rice and garnish with green onions.
