

## Mail Service Center Tips for Handling

## **Suspicious Packages or Envelopes**

- Carefully inspect mail for unusual characteristics. If in doubt, DO NOT OPEN.
- 2. If opened mail reveals a suspicious substance, set it down on a flat surface immediately. If possible, cover the area. Do not try to clean up the substance.
- 3. Clear people from the area and cordon off to restrict access.
- 4. Make a list of anyone who may have had contact with the item or substance and direct them to wash hands and other exposed skin with soap and water. Isolate them in a designated area to await further instructions.
- Shut down all equipment in the area, including heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems, as well as personal fans or heaters.
- **6.** Wearing protective equipment, write down the following details:
  - · Location of the mail item or substance,
  - Description of the substance,
  - Description of the mail item (markings, labels, declarations, postage),
  - · Name and address of sender.
  - · Name and address of addressee.

7. If yours is a state agency in Wake County, report the incident to the State Capitol Police 919-733-3333; if outside of this area, contact your local law enforcement agency.

**8.** Also notify the Postal Inspection Service (toll-free) at 1-877-876-2455. They may conduct a threat assessment.
