# **SWEBS** at Leaders Heights Elementary

SWEBS is an acronym for School-wide Effective Behavior Management System. The purpose of SWEBS is to create clear expectations for our students' behavior. The system provides rewards for those students who consistently meet the school's expectations for behavior and logical consequences for those students who do not.


Leaders Heights Elementary has four expectations for students' behavior. They are:

- Be Safe
- Be Respectful
- Be Responsible
- Be a Good Friend

Leaders Heights Elementary has been implementing SWEBS since the beginning of the school

year. As a reminder of how the system operates, each marking period, students' behavior will be tracked. Students who meet our Un-bee-lievable Expectations will be eligible for a reward at the end of the nine weeks. This reward could be a snack, an activity, and/or a prize.

Students who receive a behavior incident report and/or are referred to the principal during the marking period will not be eligible to participate. While the reward is given, those ineligible students will focus on what they can do in order to meet the expectations for the following marking period. This goalsetting will be done in a small group setting with the guidance counselor. At the end of each marking period students' behav-



Our goal through this behavior system is to help our students to become more responsible, respectful, and safe.



PSSA testing focuses on reading. Although official testing is done in grades 3 reading is an important skill that develops from birth through adulthood. Reading and building a love of reading begins at home. When children see parents reading magazines, newspapers and books they will want to read also. No child is ever too old to have a parent read with them or to them. Set aside a time in the day where you can sit down together and read.

Reading words is important but it is essential that students understand what they are reading. Ask questions to help him summarize the reading and identify main ideas. Some questions you might want to ask are listed below:

- What was the story about?
- Where did it take place? When did it take place?

- What was the main thing the author wanted you to learn?

Was there a character that you really liked? Why? What did you discover that you really liked? Why? What did you discover through reading this book?
