He realized that addiction does not discriminate by age and that recovery is a universal bond. - Academic Addict: He was a PhD student in pharmacology who knew a lot about drugs. His knowledge almost cost him his life. He is now a professor with over twenty years of clean time. He knows that recovery is not a science, but an experience. - What Makes Me Happy Now: She is one of the first women addicts who recovered in NA in Japan. She and others like her faced a lot of stigma and disbelief. As NA grew, they learned that there is no one way to be a recovering addict. They found their own happiness in NA. - I Was Unique: He had a professional career and an education. He thought he was different from the other addicts in NA. He soon realized that he was not unique and that he needed NA. He accepted his addiction and embraced his recovery. This article contains stories from different addicts who have found recovery in NA.
