

WAPOR welcomes you to Marrakesh. Known as “La perle du Sud” (The southern pearl), it is one of the main imperial and touristic cities of Morocco and of North Africa. It is a charismatic and historically rich city. There are numerous places to visit, spread behind ancient walls and tombs, gardens, souks, and Mosques. Due to the important touristic activity, Marrakesh is a very dynamic economic center for the local government. It is characterized by a Mediterranean climate, softened by the proximity of desert, cold in winter and very hot in summer. However, June is the best period to visit Marrakesh.

Since 2012, WAPOR has decided to hold its conferences outside of North America and Western Europe once every three years. The aim of this policy is to help build the organization everywhere in the world. The first conference outside North America and Western Europe was in Hong Kong in 2012, the second in Buenos Aires in 2015. These conferences were associated with the setting up of regional chapters in Latin America and Asia. This year, the Council approved the Constitution of a WAPOR chapter in West Asia and North Africa (WANA). The choice of Marrakesh as the host of the conference is closely associated with this decision. We want to help bring together public opinion researchers in the WANA region, and work with them in order to better understand the situation of their countries and the points of view of their people.

Beyond the theme “Public opinion in a changing world”, our program includes a diverse array of topics, representing the broad field of public opinion research and the challenges facing it in 2018. Several of the presentations will discuss public opinion in the Trump era, and a panel will be dedicated to populism around the globe. Themes such as immigration and xenophobia, war and conflict, and ideology and culture, that preoccupy scholars, journalists and pollsters, are likewise represented on the program. As always, WAPOR’s program represents global innovations in methodological improvement and measurement, this time with an emphasis on social media and data science. The program also includes papers and presentations about public opinion and science, trust in politics, the effects of media on politics, attitudes towards immigrants, gender, health-issues, political conversation and very many other topics. Please make sure to attend our keynote session on public opinion in West Asia and North Africa, that will mark WAPOR’s launch of a regional WANA WAPOR Chapter.

The program includes 31 sessions and 150 presentations (competitively selected from 196 submissions to the conference) organized in 40 sessions. We thank the 50 expert reviewers for their valuable input. Without their help, creating this program would not have been possible.

The presenters at this year’s conference represent 33 countries. The program includes 21 student submissions. We have made an effort to limit the number of panels scheduled in the very same time slot, resulting with a conference that is a half day longer, compared to last year. We also made an effort to avoid panels with more than five speakers in order to allow time for in-depth presentation and discussion. A poster session was also added, to accommodate the preferences of some of the presenters.

In sum, we look forward to three exciting days presenting diverse, state of the art research. We are confident that you will enjoy the program and the beautiful city of Marrakesh. We hope to see you again next year at the annual WAPOR conference in Toronto!
