Firelands Schools \#1 in Area for Academic Improvement
The Ohio Dept. of Education recently released the District Report Cards
for all Ohio school districts. Based on the "Performance Index", the best overall measure of achievement on the state tests, Firelands ranked \#1 in Lorain County and other surrounding districts for academic improvement increasing its score from 94.3 to 98.4 . The average student test score at South Amherst Middle School improved by 17\%. Across the district, our scores increased by $6 \%$.

The Firelands District exceeded the Value-Added measure for the first
time in the school's history. This means that the average student at Firelands
gained more than one year's academic growth over the past school year. The
district also met Annual Yearly Progress, the standard established by "No
Child Left Behind" that looks at academic progress in reading and math by
population sub-groups (ethnic, economic, disabled, etc.). Firelands was one
of only 5 of 17 area school districts that exceeded Value-Added and met AYP.
For the $7^{\text {th }}$ consecutive year, the High School earned a designation of "Excellent" from the Ohio Dept. of Education. SAMS improved to
"Effective." The elementary and overall district ratings were "Effective" as well, but were extremely close to moving up to an "Excellent" rating. The
district goal for next year is to have all buildings and the district move to the "Excellent" designation. I am confident we will earn this goal!

## Please Vote YES for the Firelands Schools Levy on NOVEMBER 2NDI <br> 

As you know, our school board has placed an operating levy on the November $2^{\text {nd }}$ ballot Passage of this 4-mill levy will assure that funding to maintain the current level of educational support for our students can be sustained.
By passing this issue, we will benefit in two ways. First, the amount needed to sustain our district's educational programs and ser vices can be kept at a minimum if we pass it now rather than waiting. Secondly, passing it now will help us avoid having to make major cuts down the road
Why do we need a levy?

1. For the past two years, the state has reduced the amount of funding for our school system. What's more, state officials are telling us to expect a reduction as high as $\mathbf{1 0 \%}$ in the next biennial budget. Since we rely on the state for $52 \%$ of our funding, this could result in a two-year loss of $\$ 1.4$ million.
2. The District has not approved a levy for new monies since 1996. Costs for health insurance, employee salaries, utilities, buses, diesel fuel, technology, textbooks, etc. have gone up considerably over the past 15 years. Like any business, at some point you need to increase revenue to meet rising costs. For the schools, the only way to do that is through passing a levy.
3. Our current 5 -year financial forecast is predicting a carryover of only $\$ 58,000$ by June 30, 2012, and a $\$ 2.5$ million deficit by June 30, 2013.
What has been done to reduce expenses?
4. All employees have agreed to a base wage freeze for the next school year.
5. Over the past three years our school board has eliminated 14 teaching positions, an administrator and five classified positions and cut the hours of seven other positions.
6. Building supply budgets were reduced by $15 \%$ this year.
7. Our district has joined consortiums to reduce our cost for utilities and health insurance costs.
8. We are exploring alternative energy options to reduce electricity costs.
What will this levy cost me?
The owner of a $\$ 100,000$ home will see a property tax increase of about $\$ 123$ per yea (\$10.43/month). Senior citizens receive a $25 \%$ discount (Homestead Exemption Act) on the first $\$ 100,000$ value of their property.
How does what Firelands residents pay in taxes for schools compare to other county districts?
$\overline{\text { Firelands }}$ residents have the lowest local tax burden to support education in Lorain County ( $14^{\text {th }}$ of 14 school districts).

## FIRELANDS MAINTAINS HIGHLY QUALIFIED TEACHERS

All of the teachers working for the Firelands Board of Education are highly qualified. Parents may request information regarding the professional qualifications of the student's classroom teachers such as licensing criteria, degree major, and graduation certification. The following federal guidelines are used to identify if a teacher is highly qualified.
To be deemed highly qualified, teachers must have:

1) a bachelor's degree
2) full state certification or licensure
3) prove that they know each subject they teach.

Teachers (in middle and high school) must prove that they know the subject they teach with:

1) a major in the subject they teach
2) credits equivalent to a major in the subject
3) passage of a state-developed test
4) an advanced certification from the state.
5) a graduate degree in that subject area.

Be fully licensed in the area they teach and achieve 100 points on the Ohio HQT Rubric or Ohio HQT Expanded Rubric. Proof may consist of a combination of teaching experience, professional development, and knowledge in the subject garnered over time in the profession.

## NOTIFICATION OF SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

The Firelands Local School District is actively participating in an effort to identify, locate and evaluate all children with special needs. Firelands provides special services for both "gifted" students and those students with "disabilities"

GIFTED SERVICES-In compliance with ORC Section 33245.07 the Firelands Local School District has developed a appropriate program for "Gifted" students enrolled in the district. This plan includes the following: a differentiated curriculum, cluster grouping, mentorships, accelerated course work, post-secondary course options, advanced placement, and pull-out programs. Students are identified in three steps: (1) pre-assessment, where student's academic performance is review-ed, (2) screening, which is usually group testing, and (3) assesment/identification, which can be either group or individual testing. Parents should receive test results within 30 days. Parents will be notified if a student qualifies for 'gifted services'.

DISABILITY SERVICES—In accordance with ORC Sections 3323.05 and 3323.08 the Firelands Local School District has developed an appropriate program for servicing students with disabilities. The Firelands School District further assu
educational placement, or educational program of a disabled child.

For children birth-age two, a disability means that a child has a delay in or more of the following areas: adaptive behavior, cognition, communication, physical development, and/or social or emotional development. For children ages three-five, a disability means that a child has a documented deficit in one or more of the following areas: communication skills, hearing abilities, motor functions, social-emotional behavior functioning, or vision abilities. School age children can be referred for assessment by teachers, munication skills, hearing abilities, motor functions, social-emotional behavior functioning, or
administrators, professional school personnel, and through cooperative efforts with parents.

Following proper identification and assessment, parents will be contacted to meet collectively with school personnel to review the test results. If the student qualifies for services, parents will be contacted to meet collectively with school personnel to review the test results. If the student qualifies for services, parents will be directly involved in all stages of developing the student's 'individualized educati
