



A 14-Day Travel Study Tour: August 1 – 14, 2010

Our 14-day summer tour of Mexico's Maya region begins in San Cristobal de las Casas, where students become immersed in the architecture, customs, and food of the contemporary Maya. The tour continues to Palenque, Yaxchilan, and Bonampak, with stunning examples of the Classic Maya Period. Our journey takes us to the Maya ruins of Calakmul, then to Becan and Xpuhil to view the Rio Bec style architecture said to have inspired the Art Deco movement! The trip back follows the Caribbean coast to Tulum, a lovely coastal town. We continue through the Yucatan jungle to other exciting destinations, including Loltun Cave, once considered a sacred portal into the underworld. After a farewell dinner, we leave the enchanting land of the Maya to catch our homeward-bound flights.

DAILY ITINERARY

DAY 1 LOS ANGELES TO SAN CRISTOBAL DE LAS CASAS

Sunday, August 1

We fly from Los Angeles to San Cristobal and, upon arrival, transfer to Hotel Casa Mexicana. Transport from airport to San Cristobal is included. For those arriving early there is an optional Cañon del Sumidero Tour.

3 nights: Hotel Casa Mexicana

DAY 2 SAN CRISTOBAL DE LAS CASAS

Monday, August 2

In the morning we take a guided walking tour of San Cristobal, named in honor of Bartolome de las Casas, a Catholic priest and defender of indigenous communities of Chiapas. San Cristobal was once an important colonial capital that remains the traditional homeland to the Tzeltal and Tzotzil Maya communities. Today, it is known for its colonial architecture, artistic community, and tourist-friendly atmosphere. Our tour includes a visit to the Cathedral of Santo Domingo and Market, as well as the Maya Medicine Museum. Lunch is at the popular El Fogon de Jovel restaurant. After, we visit the historic Museum of Jade and Amber.

Day 3 San Cristobal

Tuesday, August 3

Today's excursion is via local shuttle to Chamula and Zinacantan, traditional Tzotzil communities in the Highlands of Chiapas for a visit with members of these ancient communities to learn about their lives, food, and crafts. In Zinacantan we enjoy a lunch prepared with fresh, local food seasoned by traditional herbs and spices and in the style passed down through generations. After lunch we travel to the Na Balom Museum in San Cristobal, the home of well known anthropologists and explorers Franz and Trudy Blom.

DAY 4 SAN CRISTOBAL TO PALENQUE

Wednesday, August 4

This morning, we travel by bus to Palenque, stopping off at the Agua Azul waterfalls, a stunning example of Chiapas' natural beauty. Turquoise blue waters flowing over travertine formations appear in a luxurious jungle setting. Besides the breathtaking views, we delight to the sounds of tropical birds, monkeys, and other exotic creatures as we enjoy a picnic-style lunch. Then we continue to the Misol Ha waterfalls for an opportunity to take a refreshing swim! That evening we arrive in Palenque where we overnight at Hotel Villas Kin Ha.

1 night: Hotel Villas Kin Ha (breakfast, lunch)

Day 5 Palenque to Frontera Corozal

Thursday, August 5

Our day begins with a short drive to Palenque, followed by a guided walking tour of the ruins, one of the best known of the Classic Period Maya sites. Palenque is famous for its stunning architecture and natural setting, as well as for its important role in Maya scholarship as one of the gathering places where major breakthroughs in the decipherment of Maya hieroglyphic script took place. After a picnic-style lunch near the ruins we travel by bus through the Lacandon Maya jungle to the town of Frontera Corozal on the shores of the Usumacinta River where we stay at the Ecolodge Escudo/Jaguar.

2 nights: Ecolodge Escudo/Jaguar (breakfast, lunch)



DAY 6 FRONTERA COROZAL

Friday, August 6

Today's adventure takes us to the Usumacinta River where we experience a gentle, yet thrilling, trip down the Usumacinta River to the Classic Period Maya site of Yaxchilan. Upon our approach, Yaxchilan suddenly emerges from the lush fertility of the jungle. Yaxchilan is well known for its stunning location as well as its impressive, carved lintels and other sculptures. We lunch at the site, enjoying the exotic splendor of Yaxchilan, before journeying to nearby Bonampak, the site of some of the most famous Classic Maya Murals. To complete our day, we return to our hotel in Palenque via a leisurely canoe ride down the Rio Corozal, then by bus, immersed in the verdant jungle that rises along the river's banks.

PALENQUE TO CALAKMUL TO XPUHIL

Saturday, August 7

After an early morning, five-hour journey by bus to Campeche, we arrive at Calakmul Biosphere Reserve. Here, we transfer to off- road vehicles for an exhilarating trip to Calakmul, tucked deep within the jungle. Calakmul was one of the largest and most politically important Classic Maya centers, dominating Late Classic Maya history by its rivalry with Tikal. Calakmul is noted for its monumental architecture and majestic jungle setting. After a tour, we travel to Hotel Debliz in Xpuhil where we enjoy a marvelous night of star-gazing through the canopy of trees. Gentle sounds of the jungle add to the tranquility of being deep within nature, much as the Maya experienced it.

1 night: Hotel Debliz in Xpuhil (breakfast)

THE MAYA REGION OF MEXICO



DAY 8 XPUHIL TO BECAN TO BACALAR

Sunday, August 8

This morning we take a short trip to Becan and Xpuhil, both Terminal Classic Maya sites known for their astounding Rio Bec style architecture. We lunch on site, then travel to Rancho Encanto and the Ecolodge Eco Tucan, where we enjoy another night of magnificent views of the sky and calls of the jungle.

1 night: Rancho Encanto and the Ecolodge Eco Tucan (breakfast, lunch)

DAY 9 BACALAR TO TULUM TO PLAYA DEL CARMEN

Monday, August 9

Our day begins with a visit to Tulum, a Postclassic Maya site famed for its breathtaking location at the edge of a cliff overlooking the turquoise waters of the Caribbean. A guided tour enhances our appreciation for the world-renowned examples of later Maya architecture and murals in what is known as the International style. We lunch at a local restaurant before beginning our journey to Playa del Carmen, where we overnight at Hotel Golondrinas (200 m from beach).

2 nights: Hotel Golondrinas (breakfast, lunch)



DAY 10 PLAYA DEL CARMEN

Tuesday, August 10

People travel from around the world to visit Playa del Carmen and its beach resort—and we have the day to spend there at our leisure! There are many alluring options to choose from: a swim in the warm, gentle waves of the Caribbean; a hike along local trails to hear the calls of exotic birds and see the radiant colors and textures of the local flora; a day to journalize or add to your photo album; a chance to relax and sunbathe beneath a dazzling sun set against an azure sky; or a visit with local artisans to learn more about their culture and artistic traditions. Everyone has the chance to purchase crafts that are splendid examples of traditions from Maya times as well as those reflecting contemporary styles in Mexican art.

DAY 11 PLAYA DEL CARMEN TO COBA TO VALLADO-LID

Wednesday, August 11

After relaxing at Playa del Carmen, we travel to Coba, an important Classic Maya city in the Northern Lowlands. Most popular for its system of sacbeob, or white roads, and stunning architecture, Coba is a small but impressive site. Upon arrival, we take a guided tour of the ruins before making the short drive to our hotel in Valladolid for lunch. Then we visit the Dzinup Cenote, a sink hole/cave and famous feature of the karst topography of the Northern Lowlands. The Maya considered these cenotes to be symbolic, sacred entrances to the underworld. We overnight at Hotel Meson del Mar in Valladolid

1 night: Hotel Meson del Mar in Valladolid (breakfast, lunch)

DAY 12 VALLADOLID TO CHICHEN ITZA TO MERIDA

Thursday, August 12

In the morning we travel to the Early Postclassic Center of Chichen Itza, enticing for its dazzling architecture, an intriguing fusion of Maya and Toltec styles. The largest ballcourt in Mesoamerica is located here, with many temples full of martial and religious imagery. After a guided tour of Chichen Itza we drive to Merida, the capital of the state of Yucatan. After arriving at Hotel Dolores Alba and as the sun begins to set, we take a walking tour, allowing us to relish the rich colonial architecture and history of this charming city.

2 nights: Hotel Dolores Alba (breakfast)

DAY 13 MERIDA TO UXMAL TO LOLTUN TO MERIDA

Friday, August 13

Today, we travel to nearby Uxmal, an excellent example of the Puuc style architecture of the Maya region. After a tour of the ruins of Uxmal, we visit Loltun Cave, an awe-inspiring natural cave which shows evidence of ritual use by the Maya. Like the Dzinup Cenote, Loltun Cave was also treasured as a sacred portal into the underworld. We lunch picnic-style near the site. In the evening, we gather for a farewell dinner in Merida.

Saturday, August 14

This morning we breakfast together before transferring to Merida airport for our return to Los Angeles

LAND TOUR PRICE:

Fourteen Days and thirteen nights: approximately \$2,000. All travel within Mexico is included in the land tour price; airfare and class registration are not included in this price. (Single room supplement: \$400)

PRICE INCLUDES:

Land Transport: Charter bus with 38 reclining seats, air conditioning, a refrigerator, and a music system. The bus will be driven by a professional driver. For our tours of Bonampak and Calakmul, we will use community transport through the jungle roads. For our travel to Chamula and Zinacantan we will use tourist vans, which will also be used to shuttle people to the Merida Airport.

Canoe Travel: Tourist canoes with outboard motors designed for travel on the Grijalva and Usumacinta Rivers. Canoes include cushioned seats.

Lodging: Clean and safe hotels with double beds which can accommodate up to four people or a king-size bed.

Meals: 13 breakfasts and 8 picnic style lunches. For the Yucatan portion, the local guide will provide suggestions for restaurants. Average price per meal is \$11.00 USD. Please note: all dinners are on your own.

Tickets: All tickets to destinations within Mexico are included. Participants are responsible for transporting their luggage to and from the airports, buses, gratuities, etc.

TOUR COST DOES NOT INCLUDE:

UCLA Extension enrollment fee of \$595; round-trip airfare to Mexico; medical immunizations; passport fees; accident/baggage/Cancelation insurance; individual transfers; optional excursions or deviations from the scheduled tour; excess baggage charges; medical expenses; meals not specified in the itinerary; extra dishes and beverages not part of included meals; liquor, soft drinks, or bottled water; gratuities, laundry or valet services; telephone or cable charges; room service; and other items of a purely personal nature.
