

From the Parish Clerk

Neighbourhood plan –The questionnaires have been sent out and collected in. Please contact Parish Council Chairman John Savell if you are interested in being on the committee.

Local Plan – This deals with perceived needs for housing and will cover years up to 2033. It is envisaged that smaller villages will together account for 500 additional houses.

The final draft will be considered by an inspector, who will also look at comments and objections. There does seem to be some delay in matters.

Oxford/Cambridge **Expressway** – There are several proposed routes under consideration. The more southerly route could pass fairly close to the Parish and the Parish Council has made its reservations known to the various parties involved in the process.

No work has been done on the ongoing problem with **flooding at Draycot corner.** We are promised that work will be undertaken. The road surface at Draycot corner and at the top of Sandy Lane was on Oxfordshire Highways work schedule for March/April. Some 're-texturing' work has been done to road surface in Ickford Road. I continue to pursue these matters. There are potholes needing attention, which have been reported. Russell Chaplin has agreed to act as our Fix My Street Super user.

News from your Chairman

The weather is great at present albeit not ideal for gardens and the farming community, the trouble with this country; there is never a happy medium.

I understand that the Village Fete was a success and the stall by the Parish council and the Neighbourhood Plan committee organised by Councillor Tracey Smith together with Christine Craddock ably helped by others was well received. The information and ideas received will be looked at and considered for action if it is possible.

On the Neighbourhood Plan we are now looking at an analysis of the results so far, but this is only the beginning. The response has not been as good as we would have liked and whilst it is appreciated that website address did not help, there are plenty of questionnaires available for completion should anyone wish to complete one. To this end we will be holding another open meeting in the village sometime in September, date to be advised; enabling people to add to any comments already made or even to air their concerns going forward.

On the foot path leading to the Village Hall we are awaiting the specification from OCC for the work to see whether our own contractors can do the work at a price which is more affordable.

The decision on the Oxford to Cambridge expressway is due any day now, as to the selected corridor after which we can look at the ramifications for the parish.

There has been a meeting with the County on the issue of speeding down Sandy Lane attend by Tracey Smith and Russell Chaplin. A speed survey will be carried out on the road to determine the need. There are national guidelines which help to define the need for speed signs, these are as follows:

"National guidance on setting speed limits advises that they should be used in villages and towns i.e. where there is a reasonable amount of road side development (the guidance refers to 20 houses over a 600m length as being a good yardstick of the minimum level of development). We wait and see the results of the speed survey to see how we can this forward." The massive leak in North Close was repaired following a phone call from me as Chairman of the Parish Council, initially they had not logged the earlier calls from other residents or denied receiving them, despite issuing reference numbers to those residents. Fortunately, they attended that afternoon and a gang was in place by early evening and they worked until 1.30am to fix the leak. Russell Chaplin was then able to get Thames water to fill in the holes and finish of the surface properly.

Some potholes have been filled and we continue to work through these using our Super User Russell Chaplin. Flooding is at present not an issue but unless the potholes are filled then once the weather turns, it will be as it was before. We continue to address the matter.

We continue to get speculative planning applications from developers, but most of applications are from people making alterations to their properties, most requiring very little comment.

The Local Plan is in a state of flux and the development of Chalgrove, Culham or even Harrington are unknowns at present until SODC making their decision.

Despite the heat and lack of water I hope you will enjoy the summer and the holiday period.

At this holiday time, when many people are flying off for a well-earned break it seems a good time to write about airplane issues which are often raised with me. Many people in the constituency make their living from aviation either by flying as air crew, by travelling themselves or by working in support functions in and around Heathrow and the other major airports. There is a balance to be struck. Whenever I go to Heathrow to fly with my job I invariably meet constituents.

From time to time I receive emails complaining about aircraft noise over the constituency. In the south-east corner of the constituency the complaints are usually about air traffic from the major airports. Wind direction plays a key part in this as when Heathrow is on 'easterly' operations planes come in to land over the constituency. Also at busy times planes can circle in a holding pattern and the turning increases the noise at ground level. In addition, in the holiday season there seems to be an increase in planes from Luton making their ascent over the constituency. NATS acknowledge the issues but confirm that there has not been any particular change that would have increased these issues recently. I continue to be in touch with them.

The issue of a third runway has been a hot topic too. There are many factors to consider. One issue is how the provision of a third runway would take away the need for stacking of planes waiting to land. Stacking creates pollution and noise as aircraft circle in wait. I expect a third runway to do away with stacking so planes will be able to land straight away.

In other parts of the constituency I receive complaints on light pleasure aircraft practising their acrobatics over and over. This can create a noise nuisance as they circle round in the same airspace. We sit between the restricted airspace around Heathrow and Oxford airports, and in this unrestricted space this activity is permitted. I acknowledge that this is a problem and also that some people want somewhere to do this leisure activity. I am also aware that Oxford Airport would like to increase the restricted space around it which would narrow the free corridor and could potentially make this issue worse.

There is a European wide review of use of airspace which we should aim to participate in. We also need to be heard as the project for the new runway develops. These issues will be on the agenda for some time and I would be interested to know the views of constituents on them.

Reminiscence Packs: about 2-3 items consisting of a larger picture book such as the Robert Opie Scrapbooks covering a decade of the twentieth century. Packs are in an A3 plastic portfolio case with a handle making them easily portable.

Pictures to Share: books cover a variety of themes such as pets, travel, countryside and shopping. They are mostly pictures and a small amount of text and are ideal to develop a sense of togetherness with someone who is finding communication difficult.



GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

August 2018

I do hope that by the time you read this that the weather will have broken and we will be having some welcome and muchneeded rain. I am old enough to remember clearly the summer of 1976 when the dry weather lasted much longer, but I was a student and had no interest in gardening in those days so it didn't really have much impact on me.

It is now several weeks since I started to cut back sad-looking plants which just were not coping with the heat and the dry soil. This is sometimes called The Hampton Court Hack after the garden show taking place around the same time. Usually this results in some good regrowth and everything looks tidier; this year the drought has prevented regrowth. We then had 10 days away and returned to a desiccated garden, but with a fair number of plants still looking pretty good. Our pots still look great thanks to Anne and John (beyond the call of duty). I have a general policy of watering only new additions to the garden and a few favourites that need a little more water. This summer I have extended the favourites watering a bit further, but most of the garden has had no water at all and it is certainly showing. I think there are likely to be some sizeable gaps by next spring so planting opportunities will abound; there is always a plus side to everything!

The weather has encouraged pests, but also pest predators so largely there doesn't seem to be a much worse problem than usual. Our aubergine plant (we have only one in the greenhouse bed which is sufficient for us) was completely covered in aphids; there didn't seem to be a clean leaf. I do virtually no chemical spraying these days, but thought instead I would use some simple soft soap spray which works on contact. However, life got in the way and by the time I got around to doing it, the plant was covered in ladybird larvae which are large scarylooking creatures which do not resemble ladybirds other than in colour. They have a voracious appetite for aphids and the plant was clean. Continued.... It is now producing an amazing quantity of aubergines which have a much better flavour than shop bought ones. You just need to be patient in most cases as ladybirds and other predators (including wasps which love aphids until they turn to sugar in late summer) will usually show up in time. The other pest which is enjoying the heat is red spider mite which is hard to spot until the plant becomes speckled and looks sick; by then webs can be seen particularly around the shoots of plants.

This is usually a problem in greenhouses, but I can see it is affecting a couple of Salvias deep in the border. I can't do much about it other than spray with water which the mites do not like. In the greenhouse, you could use a predator which you can buy online, but that is not practical out in the open.

I'm sure that, like ours, your lawn is straw coloured and looks dead; there is no need to worry, with the first good rain regrowth will begin and all will be well.

You certainly do not need to water it and in rapidly approaching water shortages this would be anti-social. The weeds in the lawn are now very visible so I do intend to use a spot weed killer on dandelions as it is easy to use very small amounts when everything is so clear.

We don't ever 'feed'n'weed' our lawn which is simply mown field as that just results in more mowing and my other half has plenty of that already! Also, I like having daisies and other wild flowers appearing between cuts. Just enjoy the luxury of not mowing while it lasts.

Keep watering to a minimum concentrating on pots, which will add colour to the desert, and your fruit and vegetables.

Enjoy your harvest.
